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

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Example 2.4-1 Homeowner's insurance is a put option:

Value of house = \$200,000Deductible = \$25,000Premium = \$15,000



The premium of the insurance or the value of the put option depends on

- ► Riskiness of the underlying asset
- ► The amount of deductible.

Difference with options

- ▶ Put option pays off no matter why the index price declines.
- ➤ Insurance pays off only if the house declines in value for for specific reasons.

A put option is an insurance

- 1. for an asset we already own.
- 2. for a long position.
- 3. against an decrease in value.

A call option is an insurance

- 1. for an asset we plan to own in the future.
- 2. for a short position.
- 3. against an increase in price.
